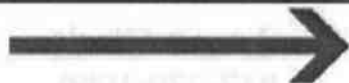

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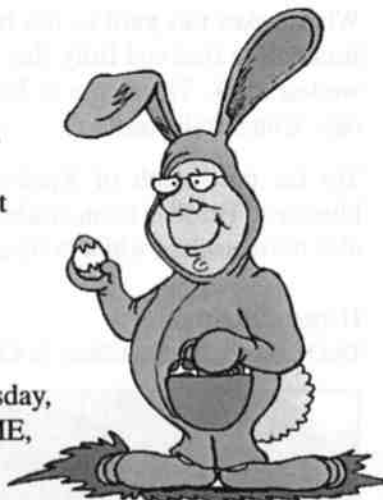
Mistletoe Heights Easter Egg Hunt

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National Arbor Day

One of the more wonderful things about Mistletoe Heights is the trees. We have many mature oaks and pecans lining our streets and shading our yards. However, according to the National Arbor Day Foundation, tree cover in the average American neighborhood has dropped by more than 20% just in the last 10 years! That is an unhealthy trend.

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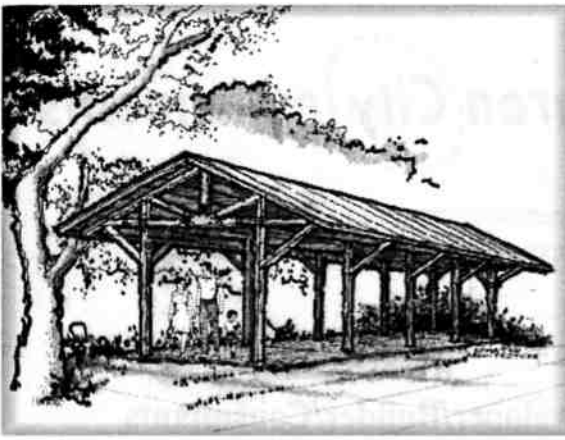

Cats...Cats...Cats...Cats...Cats...

We've all seen 'em. Some of us have several. Many of us feed them. Now there seems to be a new flock... herd... passel... drove... pack... whatever, of kittens figuring out whether they can beat your car across the street. Here in Fairmount we have a little bit of every type of cat – from the pampered Persian who watches the goings on from a window in disdain, including the scared and hungry cat abandoned by a resident who left the neighborhood to the cat so wild you barely see it streak across the yard.

Over the last year, the Fairmount Feral Friends (or whatever we call ourselves) have trapped over 100 cats. In conjunction with the Humane Society of North Texas, they've received their rabies shots as well as a 4-in-1 shot for general feline diseases, been neutered or spayed, ear tipped and returned to their home ground. A small percentage, too ill to save, was euthanized. A larger number, deemed adoptable, were kept by HSNT for adoption. Obviously, we haven't completed the project.



During 2003 budget constraints at HSNT made it necessary for them to charge us \$15 per cat for neutering and spaying. While that price is exceptionally low (the next best low-cost clinic charges \$65 and \$75 per cat) it has meant a need to reassess our program. Private donations to the program and money dropped into the jar at Old Home Supply (THANK YOU, Ralph Watterson!) have totaled about \$150. At the same time, other neighborhoods, hearing about our program, have requested assistance, further stretching our time and people resources. Fortunately, we've had extra traps at the time to loan and they've been able to pay their own way.

We're currently working with the city, the Animal Control department and a new advocacy group called CLASP to try to obtain some grants which will allow the program to be expanded city wide. Program implementation will probably still be retained in the neighborhoods, so the need for citizen involvement in trapping and transporting will still exist. All this, however, is a year or more down the road. In 2004 we again requested and received funds for the Cat Project based on the numbers from 2003. However, changes at HSNT have meant the collections days have been reduced to two Tuesdays a month and our secondary source for altering and vaccination costs \$20 per cat. As always, we need more people to trap and transport.

However, if you have stray, abandoned or feral cats around your house that need to be trapped, we usually have traps you can borrow and we'll arrange transportation, if at all possible, when necessary. Please contact me, Susan Harper, at 817-927-7257 and leave a message. I'll return your call.

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Talking Points for Code Rangers

The Code Rangers Program is a volunteer-driven citizen involvement program. It aims to use citizens in partnership with the City of Fort Worth Code Compliance Department to help report code violations and encourage citizens to voluntarily correct those violations.

Code Rangers will patrol their neighborhoods at their convenience, and identify specific types of Code violations. They will then report their findings to staff members in the Code Compliance Department. The City will send a courtesy notice to the owner or occupant of the property where the violation occurred. This notice will be sent based on the Code Rangers' trained observation alone. No Code Compliance Officer will check property before the initial notice is sent. This courtesy notice is not an official notice, but a friendly warning to the property owner or occupant.

After ten days, the Code Ranger will do a follow-up inspection to see if the violation has been corrected. If it has been corrected, the voluntary compliance will be documented. If the violation persists, a Code Enforcement Officer will visit the property and issue an official notice to correct the violation. At this point, the report will be handled like all other reports received by Code Compliance. The Code Ranger may continue to monitor the property and receive updates from the Code Enforcement Officer.

When will the program start?

Training for Code Ranger volunteers will begin in March and volunteers will begin patrols by April.

How long will training be?

Probably a 12-hour course, divided into three 4-hour units. All units will be offered at various times. Participants must complete all units, pass an exam, and participate in a ride-along with a Code Enforcement Officer before beginning their patrols.

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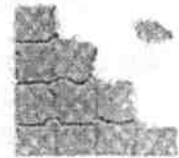
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Weather – April 2004

Who will teach the training?

Code Enforcement Officers assigned to the program as well as other City personnel.

How much will it cost to participate?

Participation is free.

Who will be allowed to participate?

Participation will first be offered to the neighborhood associations. Individuals may join and be added to existing groups. Where a neighborhood association does not exist and there are interested individuals, the City may assist in organizing a Code Ranger group to patrol that area.

Will participants get out of their cars and talk to property owners?

NO. Participants will be instructed NOT to talk to or otherwise contact, on their own, any property owner or resident. Participants will be instructed NOT to enter onto private property at any time. All violations worked by the Code Rangers MUST be visible from the public right-of-way. All other violations will be worked by the professionals in the Code Compliance Department.

Will participants have a sign on their cars identifying them as a Code Ranger?

No.

Will participants be reimbursed for gas?

Not at this time.

Will participants sign their names to the courtesy notice?

No. The alerts will come from "the Code Rangers Program," NOT from an individual. The participants' privacy will be protected at all times.

What about substandard buildings?

Code Rangers may report any type of violation observed in their neighborhoods. However, they will only work certain violations. More serious code violations such as substandard buildings will be handled with immediate action by Code Compliance. No courtesy notice from the Code Rangers will be sent.

How can people become involved in the program?

Right now, they can let their Neighborhood Association know that they are interested in participation. The Code Compliance Department will be contacting Neighborhood Associations to solicit participation. Interested persons may also contact Senior Officer John Hancock at (817) 871-6320 for more information regarding the program.

121T / Southwest Parkway Update

I am one of the two representatives for City Council District 9 (which includes Mistletoe Heights) on the Citizen's Advisory Group (known as CAG) for the 121T/Southwest Parkway project. The group has recently issued a Goals Statement for its work, which includes the following:

- Protect and enhance the environmental quality of the project, minimizing impacts in an effort to "tread lightly on the land".
- Integrate principles of context sensitive design and solutions in the project corridor to provide a coordinated design character.
- Unify the appearance of each discrete section of the project, creating a seamless transition between sections.
- Provide appropriate design features such as architectural enhancements, public art and landscaping reflecting the character of each area while maintaining the parkway's overall context.

Primarily, the CAG will be responsible for recommending allocation of the enhancement budget currently estimated at \$8 million, which will be used to support the objective of creating a parkway effect for this roadway as opposed to an urban freeway wherever possible. We may also be able to assist in identifying where mitigation of the roadway's impact is required (which would be funded separately by TXDOT and NTTA). To date, we have met three times and taken a bus tour of the entire corridor from Summit Avenue near downtown to Dirks Road where the initial section of 121T will terminate.

At our last meeting, we determined major areas of concern and priority along the corridor, and the consulting team for the project is developing ideas for those areas to be reviewed at a meeting tentatively scheduled in April.

Some items of concern and priority particular to Mistletoe Heights include:

1. Lighting design (lower light standards with directed light in accordance with the latest "dark sky" objectives)
2. Noise abatement near residential areas
3. The possibility of linking Mistletoe Heights to the Trinity River Trail system
4. The 121T bridges over the Trinity River near Forest Park will add to the significant bridge structure already in place over the trail system at the same location expanding the trail's tunnel effect there. The lanes of T121 will be separated to let in more light and ideas for beautification and constructive use of the space under all these bridges are being considered. Trail parking has been mentioned as a possibility.
5. Access from Forest Park to eastbound I30 and from westbound I30 to Forest Park will be changed with 121T. We will be using the Summit intersection much more after 121T is constructed, and traffic studies of that intersection have been suggested.
6. Architectural design of the roadway near MH
7. Architectural design of the controlled intersection of 121T and Forest Park Blvd.

All meetings are open to the public and dates and times are posted in the Fort Worth Star Telegram on the city page. All of the materials reviewed by the CAG (including preliminary engineering schematics) are posted on the T121 website, <http://www.sh-121t.org>.

As to the overall status of the project, the CAG process is running concurrently with the completion of a Final Environmental Impact Statement (FEIS). Final engineering cannot be completed until the FEIS is complete. There was considerable public comment at the public hearing for the Draft Environmental Impact Statement (DEIS) from citizens and property owners along the corridor. Personally, I hope to see some additional comment on Mistletoe Heights and perhaps some suggested mitigation when the FEIS or an amended DEIS is issued later this summer, based on the noise, air quality, lighting and cumulative effects of 121T (when combined with I30, the Rosedale bridge, etc.) on our neighborhood.

Some Mistletoe Heights History

On the sixth of March, 1836, Texas gained independence from Mexico and the Republic of Texas was created. The Texas legislature, on February 4, 1841, passed an act "Granting Land to Immigrants". The first contract, signed on August 30, 1841, by the Republic of Texas under this act was with Texas Land and Emigration Company. This company was formed by 20 investors headed by William S. Peters. The first contract established the boundaries for a colony, beginning on the Red River at the mouth of Big Mineral Creek, running south for 60 miles, then west 22 miles, then north to the Red River, then east along the river to the point of origin. This Colony was commonly known as Peter's Colony. Additional contracts for the Peter's Colony were made with the east boundary extended south to somewhere in Ellis County, then west to about the Johnson/Hood County line and then north to the Red River and east to the original contract corner.

On December 29, 1845, Texas became a state and a part of the United States of America. With the need for colonial protection, in 1849, General Williams Jenkins Worth, stationed in San Antonio, commissioned Major Ripley A. Arnold to establish an army post, and the site was picked near the confluence of the Clear and West forks of the Trinity River. It later became Fort Worth.

With Peter's Colony having been established, a group of men were selected to handle the affairs of legality. This group was known as Commissioners. In about 1848 (have not found this particular record), Ethelbert S. Harris applied for a land grant. (He lived with his family in Sherman, Texas.) Certificate No. 355 was issued on April 22, 1850, granting Ethelbert S. Harris a section (640 acres - one square mile) of land in which our neighborhood of Mistletoe Heights is situated. The section was assigned to Lemuel J. Edwards on June 21, 1852, and ownership was transferred that day. The section was not surveyed, however, until January 4, 1853.

Reading the field notes of record, this survey indicates the boundaries to be (picture, if you will, the vicinity of these lines): starting near the intersection of Pennsylvania Avenue and Eighth Avenue and draw a line south along Eighth Avenue to the intersection of Windsor Place (if it went all the way through) for the east boundary; thence west along Windsor Place to about where University Drive is now for the south boundary; thence north along University to the intersection of a line extended from Pennsylvania Avenue for the west boundary; thence east to the point of beginning for the north boundary.
