Great Gardening Tips

Try starting seeds in eggshell halves. It's economical and earth-friendly. Store planted shells in egg carts so they can easily be moved to sunny spots. Plant as is. Roots break through and the decomposed shell acts as fertilizers.

When building a garden, use newspaper under your loam and topsoil. The newspaper will kill all the weeds and grass underneath, plus it will compost into great mulch that roots can grow through.



Carport Requirements

The Fort Worth City Council has approved a grandfather clause regarding existing carports, providing owners a window of time to obtain a permit and make illegal carports legal. Beginning Sept. 1, 2004, both the Code Compliance Dept. and the Development Dept. Inspection Division will issue notices and citation for any carports that do not have a permit.



Once a permit is obtained, your existing side or rear yard carport may remain regardless if it violates setbacks, placement and/or size. However, should the carport be destroyed or removed, any new construction would have to follow current ordinance requirements. The city encourages owners to know the latest requirements to avoid citations and expensive fines.






Let's Do It Right, Please!

We're a pretty intelligent bunch here in the neighborhood. But it looks like some of us need to take another look at the instructions when it comes to our garbage and recycling habits. Maybe this little reminder of some of the most obvious infractions will help make the job more efficient and cost-effective for the folks we're paying to clean up after us. After all, it's our money!

- If you're not home to notice, you may not know that most of the new collection trucks have automated "arms" that reach out, grab the bin and dump the contents into the truck. That means the bins cannot be filled to overflowing (lids must close completely) and they must be placed at least two feet away from other bins, utility poles, trees, meters, fire hydrants, cars, sprinkler heads or other items that the collection equipment could damage, or that could prevent the arms from grabbing the bins. That also means the bins must be lined up straight, each within two feet of the curb.
- Please review the instructions you received along with your bins. No, you can't put plastic bags in the recycling carts. Or egg cartons.
 Or those shiny boxes frozen entrees and such come in. Or bottle and jar caps and lids. Or a lot of other things that we're paying the recycling workers to sort out and discard.
- We even heard about one family (not in this neighborhood) that simply dumped their garbage in the garbage cart. No bags, just garbage. Yuck! And if you have found that you need a larger cart, order one!
- Bottom line: Please get out your instructions and review them so we can keep our utility costs down. If you can't find them you can
 call 817-392-EASY (3279) for a new copy. That number is also good for any questions you may have, or for ordering one of those
 money-saving yard carts.

It's a good system. Let's all cooperate to make it the best.

Carport Requirements (continued)

• Owners MUST obtain a building permit by September 1, 2004, in order for the carport to be considered legal. After the September deadline, owners will be given a double penalty fee for building a structure without a building

All carports constructed before January 18, 2003:

 Owners WILL NOT be required to go before the Board of Adjustment for violating any rear and side yard setback requirements.

All front yard carports:

permit.

 Owners MUST go before the Board of Adjustments and request a special exception for existing and proposed front yard carports.

The special exception fee for existing front yard carports will be waived if the application is received before September 1, 2004. The special exception fee for proposed front yard carports is \$150.

Basic Flower Gardening for the Beginner

For the beginner flower gardener, there are three types of flowers to consider for your beds or planters. The types are bulbs, annuals and perennials. If you plant all three, you will have a garden filled with color all year long.

Spring blooming bulbs, such as daffodils, crocus or tulips are usually planted in the fall and will bloom from early to late spring. Once planted, you can leave them in the ground year after year (tulips do not do well for more than one year here).

Annuals are planted early in the spring after the danger of frost and will bloom all summer. However, they only have one season life span. Here in this area, sometimes an annual will life though a mild winter. Usually, however, they have to be replaced each year. Examples of annuals are: begonias, petunias, daisies, zinnias, etc. You may plant by seed, but the easy way is to buy sturdy plants in the spring.

Perennials bloom year after year and do not require the expense of replanting. They do have a definite blooming period, so when planting, it is advisable to choose different plants with different blooming times. Perennials need to be thinned every season or so, as they tend to reproduce and crowd each other.

All flowering plants need ample fertilizer along with plenty of moisture. Osmocote is a slow release fertilizer and should last up to 6-12 weeks before reapplying. Liquid fertilizers such as Miracle Grow also work well, but need to be applied more often.



Hints on Housekeeping



An unexplored popular fallacy assumes that the ordinary cookbook is of positive value to the young housekeeper. Rarely does a bride start in upon her term of hard labor without receiving one or more of these manuals. Thus armed, she is better equipped for any emergency.

If special stress is laid upon the difficulties besetting cookery, it is not only because these "jump at the eyes", but also because this, in many respects the most

important branch of housekeeping, is generally the one of which the beginner knows least. She must indeed be dull if she is unable to make a bed or to dust a room, or if she cannot, by some methods--or lack of it-- get dishes clean, or even though with struggles and weariness, sweep a room. But when she turns to the kitchen she enters a province in which she has no practice, and where the light of nature utterly fails to illuminate.

It was upon this that a beginner relied when she attempted to cook her first steak. Her common sense told her that the meat had probably been handled by dirty fingers. The only inference was that it should be cleansed. And forthwith she plunged it into a pan of warm water and washed it well. Then she laid it, white and limp and dripping upon a ungreased gridiron. It was not a success.

I believe that a girl should have one or more terms at a cooking school before she is married. Thus armed she may, with an air of conscious modesty, escape the stale jokes about newly-made husbands who are forced to flee to the club to escape starvation.

Not for a moment would even a graduate from that school imagine that all domestic knowledge could be imparted to the young housekeeper, but some of the problems may be simplified, some of the terms explained, and the footsore stumbler becomes, after a time, weakly grateful for the removal of even a pebble from her path. There is a goodly fellowship of untrained young married women who are either in a continual state of weakness and fear and much trembling lest their cooks should go and leave them to their own destruction, or who are learning hard lessons by experience – the only school, as the bitter proverb runs, in which fools will learn.
