Letter from the president






J.P. started taking theater classes when he was 5 years old.

memorized the whole *Wizard of Oz*," his mom notes. "The songs, every single line, perfectly."

In the second grade talent show, he sang "New York, New York." The audience seemed pleased. "I mean, like, cameras blinded me," J.P. recalls.

It's funny, though. As much as J.P. enjoys performing, he finds it hard to act in front of only a few people. "I can't do it with, like, four people, because they're all looking at me and I can see all of them."

> "But if there's 2,000..." says Simone. "...I don't care because they're all blurry," J.P. adds "Cause I can't really see each individual person."

J.P. hasn't had much time this year to focus on performing. School at McLean 6th Grade Center has been a big change. He's got an hour's worth of homework a night and he takes trumpet lessons. There are other interests, too.

J.P. enjoys the work of artist Salvador Dali, and his bedroom features a collection of ventriloquist dolls – the kind used by performers who "throw" their voices and make it appear as though the doll is talking. He plays Nintendo _ but only on the weekends, his mom says. And he's a fan of Louis Prima, a crooner famous during the 1950s and '60s.

When he's ready for a career, J.P. says he'd like to be a "director, animator,

actor, game programmer."

Who knows? One day J.P Scott may be to Mistletoe Heights what "American Idol" Kelly Clarkson is to Burleson: our very own hometown celebrity.

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Celebrities Among Us

Deborah Jung The Lady Who Cares

As executive director of the well-known Fort Worth musical theater company *Kids Who Care*, Deborah Jung has produced and directed tours of ten original works. Kids Who Care performed last year the Lamb's Theatre in New York City and has appeared at the Kennedy Center, Bass Hall, for NYC and LA City Kids, as well as in Orlando, Germany, Italy, Nashville, Chicago and across Texas.

When Deborah is not directing, producing, acting, teaching or fundraising, she comes home to 2340 Mistletoe Boulevard, the home she and her husband Dexter bought 21 years ago. Their house, a bungalow built in 1921, was previously owned by Mrs. Petta of Petta's Italian Restaurant. "She made all of the cheesecakes here!" Ms. Jung recalls. "MMMM! Good karma!"

At the time the Jungs became Mistletoe Heights residents, their neighbors to the west, the Stewarts, had just moved in and the Jones across the street had just gotten married. "We raised our children together," Jung says. "Halloweens, Fourth of July Floats for the parade, standing on our front porches, comparing incoming storms, or buying each other's garage sale items, we have known each other for most of our married lives."

For a number of years their house became known as a popular destination on Halloween—not due to Deborah's formidable theatrical gifts, but because of the stage skills of her older son Chad, ably assisted by his best friend Chris Myers. The lighting and sound equipment Chad was collecting as an up-and-coming young professional were put to use to create a sound stage extraordinaire on his parents' front porch, complete with haze, strobe lights, and creepy characters appearing from behind the pillars and off the roof. "This legacy was originally inspired by our actor neighbor on Irwin, Art Lippa, from Chad's childhood," says Deborah. "We would trick or treat at Art's house each year and be delighted, and always a little frightened, as we were met by gravediggers and the like."

Now a professional lighting designer, Chad has moved on to his own home. His younger brother Blake is still at home as a freshman at TCC. But even when Blake leaves, you can be sure the Jung's home will vibrate with the sounds of children rehearsing, laughing, and singing, as long as the Lady Who Cares is in residence!



Treasurer's Report: October 2004 Cash Flow

I am currently working on the annual report for 2004, and I plan on including Treasurer's reports monthly going forward. As a summary, we received \$4,604 in dues this year, and many thanks to all who contributed. The ending cash balance as of October, 2003, was \$6,492, so over the past 12 months the cash balance has increased by approximately \$3,000 - mainly as a result of the dues collections.

On a monthly basis, the net cash gain from advertising is between \$100 - \$150, and we pay water bills, decorations, welcome baskets, celebration costs, and so forth out of the cash balance and the advertising collections.

In December, the association will fund Christmas decorations and party expenses. It will soon be time for annual dues to replenish our coffers to cover normal monthly expenses and, hopefully, any capital improvements. 

LET'S BRING IT ON HOME!

The pavilion committee for Friends of Newby Park announced that the foundation for the pavilion has been staked and the site approved by the City Inspector. This staking will keep our permit in place for a year. Hopefully, construction can start soon after the first of the year.

Also, the committee is pleased to announce that Elizabeth Anna of Old World Gardens on 8th Avenue will do the landscape design for the pavilion project. She was enthused about the pavilion, and will have the landscaping design ready in January 2005. She also said she would give a design for planting of the flowerbed that will be in accord with the pavilion plantings. For those who may have not heard, Newby Park was included in the last bond election for funding for a new playground. \$91,000 has been set aside for a replacement playground and playground equipment. The Park Department will allow MHA to vote on the design that the residents prefer. The new playground will be set approximately where the old one is currently, but will be somewhat larger. The basketball court will remain the same. When all this is completed for Newby Park, we will have a showplace for the neighborhood.

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DECORATING WITH HOUSE PLANTS By Patsy Slocum

You may alter the looks of your living area using tall, tropical plants that can define spaces in a room and accent the

architectural design. Quoting from a design consultant, "Tall plants draw your eye up, so they give a room more height." Some of the tropical plants one can use are **Bird of Paradise** (stelizia nicola), Fiddleleaf fig (ficus Lyrata), Ming Aralia (Polyscias fruitcosa) or Rhapes Palm.

Most large, broad leafed plants require a lot of light, but should not be in direct sun. Most big, leafy greens like a temperature of 70 to 80 degrees during the day, 60 to 70 at night. They don't like being in a drafty place or extreme changes in temperature. They do like a fair amount of humidity, so a humidifier nearby might help. It helps to buy from a reputable nursery, and some may be pricey if they have been grown in an indoor environment. Cheaper plants are grown in fields and may not survive in a new location. Be sure to choose a plant with a balanced shape, with the leaves bright green and no sign of insects. You should take into account how tall and wide the plant will grow.

Be sure that the pot you use has a drainage hole with a saucer underneath to catch excess water. Most plants are killed by excessive watering. A good rule is to poke your finger into the soil to the second knuckle. If the soil feels damp, do not water. Indoor plants become dormant in the winter, so need less water.

Fertilize in the spring and summer with 10-10-10 fertilizer. Large plants also need to be kept clean. If the plant is not too heavy, place the plant in the shower or take it

outside on a nice day and spray the leaves. If this is not possible, wipe the leaves with a soft, damp cloth. If insects make an appearance (most common are white flies, mealy bugs, and spider mites), they can be eliminated by spraying the plant with nontoxic insecticidal liquid soap.

The **Fiddleleaf Fig** has large, leathery, violin-shaped leaves and grows to 7-to-10 feet

tall and 4 to 5 feet wide. It likes high light and frequent watering and will grow up to 12 inches a year. The **Ming Aralia** is slow growing and has a gnarled trunk. It has small, curled leaves and grows up to 8 feet tall and 3 feet wide. Its narrow shape can be tucked in next to a stairwell. The **Rhapis Palm** is also known as the "lady palm." It is deep green with five-fingered fronds and grows up to 8 feet tall and 4 feet wide. It likes low light, moist soil, and should be fed no more than once during the growing season. It could be used as a counterpoint to a piano or a room divider. The **Bird of Paradise** has large, dark-green, oval-shaped leaves. It grows up to 8 feet tall and six feet wide and requires plenty of room to spread out. In a large space, it could help define separate living areas or highlight a column. It is a fast grower and puts on up to 2 feet a year.

The Kitty Club (a.k.a. Trap. Neuter and Return)

Do you have a problem with stray cats near your home? We have a humane program that can offer some relief, for you and for the felines, too.

Mistletoe Heights is now a participant in the *Trap, Neuter and Return* program that approaches the front end of the stray cat problem. Rather than spending time and resources constantly trying to round up and kill stray cats, TNR works with spaying or neutering the feral cats to prevent the cats from multiplying. These cats are also vaccinated and given rabies shots to prevent the spread of disease, then are released back at their "home." Any young kittens that can be tamed will be placed in good homes after they have been vaccinated and neutered.

This program has been in effect in the Fairmount neighborhood for several years and has made a noticeable improvement in feral cat "colonies."



Several veterinarians in the Metroplex offer their services for members of *Trap, Neuter and Return* at a very reduced rate. We have volunteers from **Kittico** who take the cats in for treatment, then return them, usually the same day. The cats receiving treatment must be feral, no pets will be accepted in the program. Any cats who are diseased will be humanely euthanized.

There are some funds for treatment. Donations are gladly accepted, too, and all money collected goes for treatment.

In the last two months, we have trapped 14 cats and kittens. Six of



trapped 14 cats and kittens. Six of the kittens were tamed and now live in loving homes. One solid black kitten we named "Pinky" (Just ask and we will email the video of the original Pinky and you will get the idea. You will also laugh so hard you will be on the floor) was wild as a cootie, even after 3 weeks of trying to tame him, so he went back with his wild mom, who was also treated. Ya can't win 'em all, but we can try.

If you are looking for a sweet kitten, with shots and spaying or neutering, let us know. We will probably be getting more any day now.







In the past few weeks a number of emails circulated that deserved general distribution. Here they are with minor edits.

Q: I was curious if anyone has had any luck keeping squirrels from eating into their attic? I've had a constant problem and have just replaced numerous pieces of wood, and yet in one week I have a new golf-ball-size hole again. Any thoughts?

A: I have had the same problem with the squirrels (as have, I'm sure, everyone else in the neighborhood). What I finally did (and it has worked for the past year now) was take a pill bottle, drill some holes in it, fill it with cotton balls, and then soak the cotton balls in red fox urine. I then tacked it up to the area where they have been giving the problem. So far, so good. I will say this, though, make sure to wear gloves; you don't want any of that stuff on your hands or anywhere else for that matter. I also nominate as "Worst Job in the World", the people who have to collect this stuff.

A: I have repaired my holes with sheet metal and used mothballs as a repellent. The truth is I do not know which portion works because I have never become reinfested. Maybe it was the mothballs (which also repel cats from your flower beds) and then maybe the sheet metal convinced the critters to move on. Either way it seems to work.



Q: I noticed the black paint on a couple of our block's streetlights has come off. What's the process for getting the city to repaint, or is our block responsible for upkeep? The globe on one of our street lights is broken and another is leaning what should I do?

A: The city will quickly fix streetlights if you report them (they consider it a safety issue). The number to call to report one is 871-8100. They also are responsible for painting although the quickly part may not apply.
