

Letter from the president

Herb Gardening By Dotty Guffey

"Gardening is not graceful, and it makes one hot; but it is a blessed sort of work and if Eve had had a spade in paradise and known what to do with it, we should not have had all that sad business of the apple." ~ Countess Von Armin

If you think gardening is too difficult, you might try being an herb enthusiast. Herbs don't require much attention and often live in

enthusiast. Herbs don't require much attention and often live in poor soil conditions. Herbs can be grown for insect management, cooking, drying for wreaths and gifts and canning. Also, hummingbirds and bees like the nectar of their flowers.

At age 25, I planted my first big herbal garden. As I struggled to learn the art of gardening, my haphazard planting lacked a focal point. I had to learn quickly how to propagate dry seeds and arrange to prevent my little space from looking like a weed garden. As a focal point, choose a feathery silver-green-leafed Artemisia variety that grows from three and five feet high. A bird bath suffices as well. Working out from the focal point, introduce such additional herbs as basil, thyme and scented (rose, nutmeg, apple, peppermint and many more) geraniums, and plant them in pots because they freeze.

Also, fennel, yarrow and dill make nectar to encourage beneficial insects, hummingbirds and bees. Then there are bug trap plants such as nasturtiums and mustard that attract harmful insects. If organically grown, fresh nasturtium flowers in a salad introduce a peppery flavor. Rosemary, an evergreen, can be a lot of fun trimmed into shapes as a bonsai focal point and fabulous for culinary use.

Another possible focal point is bay, a medium dark evergreen shrub good for culinary use. Also, a couple of leaves in the flour canister repel weevils. Onion and garlic chives will prevent a quick run to the grocery store in the middle of cooking, and the flowers keep the bees busy.

Vigorous-growing culinary herbs, such as mint julep, oregano and marjoram, grow in mounds but can be controlled in pots or with plastic edging. Mint julep is especially good in ice tea on a summer day and even better with a splash of bourbon.

Summer gardening tips: (1) Two good soakings a week will keep flowers and vegetables happy. If additional water is needed, water with hose in hand early in the morning or evening. Established shrubs will take a good soaking once a week. No need to fertilize in this unbearable heat. Three inches of mulch will keep fragile plants from wilting on a hot summer day. (2) Plant fall vegetable and flower seedlings in July and early August.

That is why we need a Landscape Architect to create a plan that could be accomplished in affordable phases based on funds that we currently have and future funding. There is no limit to what our neighborhood can accomplish if we set out minds to do it. In the past 17 years that we have lived here, I have seen lots of projects completed in our neighborhood...i.e., street toppers, many trees planted in the berms, a Newby Park pavilion and playground, and other projects. In talking with lots of our residents, all seem to be in favor, but still no positive action has been taken on this. Let's get off our back sides and start the ball rolling. Let's consult with reputable Landscape Architects for this project, consider their ideas, and contract with him/her to create a design that MHA desires. I feel there are many qualified professionals that would donate or partially donate their services for this project. We greatly appreciated the contribution of Karl Komatsu for his design of the pavilion at Newby.



Yard of the month: 2324 Mistletoe Drive

The Yard of the Month award for August goes to Carol and Jack Benson at 2324 Mistletoe Drive. The home is listed in the *Tarrant County Historic Resources Survey: Phase III Fort Worth's Southside*, published in 1986 by the Historic Preservation Council for Tarrant County.

It is described as "a late example of a Moderne Style house, built in 1946. Essentially a hard-edged stuccoed box which makes remarkably few concessions to ornament and none to tradition. Its first owner was William T. Hobbs, a dealer in used trucks and trailers."

Carol and Jack have owned the property for more than 20 years. They have remodeled extensively inside and added an addition to the east side, which faithfully mirrors the original structure.

Carol is an artist, principally in painting and sculpture, but her artistic nature is certainly evident in her gardens. She spends hours in her garden tending her plants, including harvesting seeds from poppies and larkspur and sowing them at the proper time of year, propagating plants and continually experimenting with new visions of her garden.

The front yard is anchored by large beds of plants and features sculptures on each side of the yard (not her own creations, but by artist friends). The east side of the front walk features a weeping yaupon against the house and profusions of plants, including datura, nandina, dusty Miller, chrysanthemums, coleus, rosemary, privet, fringe plant, gaura, salvia and Mexican petunia.

Some of these same plants are included in the west side of the front yard in a bed curving out toward the street. A desert willow and a golden raintree add height to the area, and lower plantings that provide continual color throughout the year include lantana, day lilies, moss rose, nasturtiums, yarrow, poppies, pink and purple larkspur, rock daisies, roses, yucca, prairie grass, lambs ear, kale, coreopsis and caladiums.




