This has been a very successful program in many parts of town, but because it requires training and substantial volunteer hours, it fell by the wayside. If you would like to participate in reexamining any and all options for protecting our neighborhood, I would be pleased to have our own Mistletoe Heights "Czar" head up this process once again.

Update on MidTown: The City and the developer finally had a "meeting of the minds." Probably because an office developer signed a contract to purchase the office piece and currently intends to build not just 40,000 square feet of office space, but up to 80,000 square feet. So, we are pretty much where we were months ago when Mistletoe Heights and Berkeley agreed to the site plan comprised of 20,000 square feet of retail, 80,000 square feet of office, and a Homewood Suites Hotel and an Hilton Gardens Hotel. There will be a mid rise garage in the middle of the development with a potential for additional retail in the future. The total project cost will approach 90 million dollars! The developer has the equity inplace and is looking for financing for the construction.

I would like to thank all of you who participated in the process, especially Martin Herring, Gaye Reed, and Kathy McReynolds. We certainly have come along way from the original proposals.

We here in Mistletoe Heights hear over and over again what a wonderful neighborhood we live in. Mistletoe Heights does have it all, interesting and unique homes, wonderful events like the July 4th Parade and The Pumpkin Carving Contest. We have neighbors young and old who care about one another, which deepen our sense of belonging to something important.

With that in mind, I'd like to share the opportunity of serving our neighborhood with those who would like to become more involved. The Newsletter Editor, Secretary, Treasurer, Vice President have all given admirable service, but all of the officers, myself included, would be happy to pass on the mantle of leadership.

Elections for officers will be held on November 17, at 7pm, at 2325 Mistletoe Drive. 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F.Y.I (Flu Your Information)

Get vaccinated. Keep your distance with people who are sick and if you are sick, please stay home. Routinely, wash common surfaces with bleach or other disinfecting cleaning solution. Common surfaces such as the TV remote and the computer keyboard are often overlooked and can harbor the flu at higher levels than most items in the home. What's the first thing you grab when you are sick?

Wash your hands for the length of two stanzas of "Happy Birthday" and be sure to wash the back of your hands as well. If you sneeze or cough, be considerate and cover the cough or sneeze with your sleeve not your hand.

You can infect someone with the flu 24 hours before symptoms appear and you may be contagious for up to 7 days, children may be contagious for up to 10 days.

The flu virus can live on surfaces for up to 8 hours, so if you are touching common surfaces do not touch your eyes, mouth, or nose until you thoroughly wash your hands.

Do not let pregnant women care for others sick with the flu. Try to isolate the sick person to a particular room and try to keep that door closed. Keep the bedside of the sick person clean, and when washing the linens of a person with the flu, do not hug the linens when changing the bed. And yes, not ust the sheets need to be cleaned but the blanket needs to be cleaned as well, as do the pillows. Allergy pillow protectors that can go in the wash can keep the virus out of the pillow. Be sure to wash the mattress pad as well. Keep the eating utensils of the sick person separate and be sure to wash them separately or use disposable utensils. The sick person should not be cooking for others. Give the sick person a separate hamper. Keep their tooth brush and toothpaste in a plastic bag after use, and toss after the flu.

Use the best air filters possible for the house and spray the i ntakes with Lysol or Oust.

The practice of good personal and home hygiene is so important during this particular flu season. Children will need gentle reminders.

Drink plenty of water, eat fresh fruits and vegetables and be sure to get good restorative sleep. Odds are if you do contract the flu, you will be miserable for a week and then return to normal, but consideration for others as this new strain comes through the country maybe the best holiday gift you can give your family, co-workers, friends and neighbors.

Have a happy flu-free season.





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

The Two Hour Turkey

In my lifetime, I have made about 200 turkeys. Many of my early birds were cooked under the tutelage of Scottish women with a strong genetic penchant to roast a bird until it looked like a remnant from an archeological dig. As my mother came from a family of 12 children, the turkeys that were chosen were so big, the wings of these birds would touch the oven walls. An additional bird was lovingly overcooked and sent sealed in numerous sheets of Reynolds wrap in a car by some aunt, along with another back-up smaller bird cooked at a neighbors in their basement in the old stove, equally as dry and unappealing and wrapped ready for space orbit.

Thank goodness these Scottish women made a great stuffing, fantastic mashed potatoes and even better gravy, because the meat regardless of where it came from, or who cooked it, was like the bottom of a shoe. In the Scottish-American tradition, everything that started out green and fresh became yellow and wilted by the time you waited for that petrified turkey to be ready to serve.

So, as I began to cook on my own, I asked myself the big Thanksgiving question, "why did these meals stink?" And the answer was simple, the turkey takes too long.

What takes three days to prepare and 7 hours to cook winds up being eaten in 14 minutes. You feel beaten up, and all the feigned oohs and aahs seem cheap and meaningless. After your third load of dishes, and the hand-washing all of the "good china", you wonder who invented this holiday?

This Two Hour Turkey Recipe might help those who don't care if the bird is stuffed. It serves 6 to 8. Safeway has a two hour turkey recipe, so does Julia Child and a thousand others.

In the days before making your big dinner, be sure to clean your oven.

1 Fresh or thawed turkey weighing 12lbs.

Olive oil, kosher salt and black pepper

Preheat the oven to 475 degrees and use an oven thermometer as a backup.

Clean the bird's cavities and pat the bird dry generously cover the bird in olive oil and sprinkle lightly with salt and pepper. Do not salt the bird if it has a saline solution in it.

Place on a v shaped rack into a roasting pan. Do NOT STUFF!

Insert a meat thermometer into the thickest part of the breast. If the bird is getting too dark, cover with foil. When the turkey is 160 degrees, (start checking at the 1 hour mark) remove your bird from the oven and set in a warm, draft free spot and cover well with foil.

Let the turkey rest for 30-45 minutes while you make your sides and gravy. If the legs still need more time, you can microwave them for 2-4 minutes.

YARD OF THE MONTH - 2325 Mistletoe Drive

The November Yard of the Month honor goes to our MHA President, Jeff Davis, at 2325 Mistletoe Drive. Jeff has recently redesigned his front yard and driveway area. A new circular driveway and motor court were installed. A new stonework fountain and stone pillars capped by a copper arbor will soon be covered in yellow blooming Lady Banksia roses. Mature oak trees in the front expanse of St. Augustine grass were left untouched, but the beds surrounding the house have been totally revamped. A profusion of new plantings of varying heights will provide seasonal color. Dogwood will bloom in spring, followed by azaleas, then hydrangeas in summer. Japanese maples will lend color contrast in the fall. Knockout roses, caladiums, daisies, umbrella plant, potato vine, ornamental peppers, and turks cap add color to the new beds.

A flagstone walk sloping up to the double front door and porch is currently flanked by palms in oversized pots, near beds containing giant liriope, wood ferns, and dwarf mondo grass. Fig vine hugs the stone wall by the fountain, along with mountain laurel, boxwood, and sedum. Colorful plants including wisteria and clematis surround the stone waterfall fountain. Stone and crushed rock border the new driveway. Magnolias and dogwood and additional hydrangeas mark the southeast property line.





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
WINTER COLOR

There is a solution to dry dull lawns during the winter months. The year before last, a nice neighbor gave us some winter rye seed he had left over. So we scattered the seed in the front yard. All the neighbors were impressed with our winter lawn and frankly, so were we. Ever since, we have planted winter rye in the front and back yard.

Winter rye is easy to grow. Plant the seed after August, up to a couple of weeks before the first freeze. Sow at least six to eight pounds per 1,000 square feet. Winter rye will germinate in about 5 to 7 days if watered daily. Let it grow until it is about 6 inches tall, then mow at 4 inch setting on the mower for the first two weeks, and thereafter cut to 2 inches. Water the ryegrass weekly if winter is dry. The only disadvantage is mowing on a weekly schedule.

In addition to the velvety green ryegrass, choose a ground cover such as English ivy and/or monkey grass for the shady areas. Add color with sun loving pansies and there you have it, a splash of brillance and gleam in the dull winter months.
