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Mistletoe gas lease information

Norm Stemple, Chair of MH Gas Lease Committee

This information is for the Mistletoe Homeowners who signed a lease with Four Sevens Energy (Chesapeake Energy) in November or December 2006.

This lease had an initial term of 3 years, so it will expire as of November 2009 or December 2009 depending on when it was signed. An estimated 40-50 homeowners in Mistletoe Heights signed this lease.

In October 2006 when this lease was first offered, a MH gas lease committee was formed which was concerned with environmental protections for the neighborhood. In November 2007 after months of negotiations by the gas lease committee, a lease was signed with XTO with the following restrictions; 600 feet from well to any home, NO truck traffic on neighborhood streets, NO gas lines through the neighborhood, noise restrictions, a 25% royalty and a four year initial term which will expire in November 2011. Approximately 300 MH homeowners signed this lease with XTO.

Recently Colt Exploration (acting for XTO Energy) has sent a letter to most of the homeowners whose lease is expiring offering a new lease with a bonus of \$2400. An acre. However the lease now being offered does NOT

#### Editors Note;

No official secretarial notes were taken at the last meeting. These notes are the best of my failing memory and some help from committee chairs and updates outside of the meeting.

Michael Danella of the MH Entrance Sign Committee briefed those at the last meeting on the progress to date. The City of Fort Worth was contacted to determine requirements for the proposed improvements within the city Rosedale Street right-of-way. An Encroachment Agreement (one time charge of \$275) along with proof of a \$300,000 liability insurance policy is required.

Mike is working on getting several quotes form insurance companies. A plan indicating the specifics of proposed improvements will also be required. Other useful information received from the City includes the required set-back distance of the sign at the corner of Forest Park and Rosedale, along with the sign dimension parameters. The proposed plan will consist of landscaping and sign improvements. The design concepts of the sign include brick or stone or wood. Jeff Davis stated he will contact a local architectural firm to see if they are interested in working with the MH Entrance Sign Committee.

Jeff Davis discussed the possible desire to have a professional security patrol and it was met with not much enthusiasm with those in attendance due to financial considerations. Jeff also brought up the resurgence of Code Blue which is a citizen's

patrol. These ideas met a general feeling that crime is best handled here in Mistletoe by nosy neighbors and good practices by homeowners, although, certain folks would beg to differ with this view. Jeff welcomed interest on the topic of crime and continues to do so.

Officer Mark Russell informed the neighborhood on several thefts which were related to acquaintances of the victims. There was a garage broken into on Rosedale. On Park Place, an unhappy homeowner came home to find their living room stolen; sofas and TV along with the kit and caboodle. So please keep your eye out if your neighbor seems to be suddenly moving out without so much as a good-bye.

It seems Baylor employees, along with a number of area medical clinic's patients have been victims of purse snatching. The patient goes into one room and leaves their purse unattended in the last, and goodbye pocketbook. Even patient lockers have been recent targets. So please, hold onto your personal items at local physicians and clinics.



Officer Mark says to check your bank statements and credit reports on a regular basis, and be sure to not leave mail out, tempting items in your car, or outside your porch. Jeff Davis had an expensive saw stolen during his driveway renovation.

Be vigilant as always.

Rosaline Eastepp Takes discussed a letter from the railroad some Mistletoe Heights residents received. She forwarded the railroad's letter to the MH email group. Rosaline had concerns that the chlorobenzene will seep into the Trinity, as did many others. Rosaline made our neighborhood aware of this issue.

Jeff Davis promptly contacted Joel Burns regarding the timing of the letter and railroad meeting at the holidays with barely any notice to the public. If you would like a copy of the letter sent by the railroad, or information about that meeting, contact the email group, or if you have any questions, Jeff will be happy to tell you what he knows.

Gaye Reed informed the neighborhood about the Midtown Village. She handed out a diagramed map of the new complex,

and told us the developer is moving forward. Midtown Village will have 2 one story buildings and 1 two story building along West Rosedale for retail and office. A four story Hilton Garden Inn will have 157 guestrooms and will front Forest Park Blvd. A four story Homewood Suites with 110 guestrooms will be in the interior part of the village along what will be an extension of Jerome Street. A four level parking garage and a four story office building will make up the interior. Additional parking will line the rear of the property.

Gaye says that this is not all that the neighborhood hoped for but considering all the possibilities, it is not bad. The landscaping, according to Gaye should be fairly attractive.



A new website will be coming due to the generosity of our President, Jeff Davis. This is not a small gift and everyone in the neighborhood should thank Jeff directly for moving us into the 21<sup>st</sup> century.

Marjorie Day wrote a letter to James Huling and Jeff Davis and cc'd councilmanJoel Burns regarding the need for sidewalks along Jerome to link Newby Park and Lily B. Clayton school. Jeff also sent the same letter to Joel and Kristi Wiseman on his own, asking for help regarding this matter. Jeff handed out a partial email trail in which William Verkest, Director of Transportation and Public Works for the City of Fort Worth said he will "find some money in FY 2010 to put that sidewalk in place." Jeff said that the City of Fort Worth recognized this concern as a child safety issue and we may have some traction here to move this sidewalk forward. So see what a letter can do? I say we need all of our sidewalks repaired and fixed.

The recommendations of the traffic committee were discussed and the need to slow down traffic throughout the neighborhood. An idea for cameras to both help in crime and traffic speeds was discussed.

contain the restrictions that the MH Gas lease committee negotiated with XTO in November 2007.

An XTO representative explained that although the lease signed in 2007 (with restrictions) will be honored, all new leases will not have these restrictions; such as no truck traffic, no gas lines through the neighborhood, noise restrictions, etc.

Each homeowner (mineral rights owner) has the right to sign the new lease or not sign.

At this time the recommendation of the gas lease committee is to wait until we can get restrictions similar to that in the November 2007 lease. The gas lease committee will continue working with XTO to obtain an acceptable lease and inform the neighborhood of progress.

Mistletoe Heights Election Results: Well, there were not enough folks at the nomination meeting to take a vote. And no one came forward to take anyone's position. Hence, the elected officers will remain the same, unless someone comes forward to ask for their job. So it goes.

Cover cold sensitive plants before a freeze with grocery paper bags, old towels or light weight blankets.


Feed the birds!







#### Letter from the Editor New Year's letters to self



#### Some years back, I wrote a "Letter to Self" on

December 31, about where my life was and what I wanted for my future. This first letter contained the pains and turmoil of the year, and how I handled them, the good times with friends, along with my goals and dreams for the coming year.

On Jan 1 the next year, I opened my letter and laughed out loud when I read it. Most every pain I endured was gone. Many of my heartfelt goals were realized or had changed. However, one goal never changed and was not realized, I still was not at my "goal weight".

Year after year, I have written these "Letters to Self" and it would be a lie to say that I did not include a significant windy paragraph about "my goal weight". "The goal weight" has a constantly changing number but whether it has been as low as a hungry120lbs and as high as happier 170lbs. , the dismay, embarrassment and pain of an elusive "goal weight" remained. When I weighed 170, I thought I should weigh 140. When I weighed 140 I thought I should weigh 120...when I weight 120, ok, I never weighed 120 but I am sure I would have wanted to be 115. Now I would be happy to weigh 190 but that is just because I am not even close to 190. Sigh, and so it goes.

One gentleman in the Mistletoe Heights neighborhood has walked off 100lbs. I watch him round the corner of my block, day after day, in the horrible heat, and I always think, "God bless this guy". He has inspired me to recognize that there is no goal in weight loss but it is a constant daily decision to take on the elements.

Sometimes the elements are as simple as a rainy day walk, sometimes it is the coldness of people who decide you are less of a person because you are overweight. Regardless of the elements, a journey of selfimprovement has no goal to achieve. It's not "The Battle of The Bulge" as I was taught and believed for many years. The goal has no goal. It is simply being kind to oneself. So whatever, you decide to decide on improving for this coming year be fearless and kind to yourself at the same time because the journey is the goal.

Question: Perhaps the questions I am about to ask do not come under the head of house furnishings, but I feel that you can help me. I wish to give my living room a Christmas aspect, and I do not know how to do it. The room is large, with arched windows and doors and a fireplace. The walls are a warm neutral color, with an ivory colored ceiling. We have plenty of evergreen in the neighborhood, and I could carry out any scheme you suggest. The room has a good deal of yellow in the way of cushions and small things. If you will tell me what to do I shall be grateful. A.C.

We are delighted to give you suggestions for a Christmas room, and hope that you will have success. Red, green and white are the Christmas colors, and while too festive for everyday use, are charming for the holidays. Remove the yellow from the room and substitute red—the real Christmas red. It is a color to avoid for the rest of the year, but it has great significance at Yuletide. Your gray walls are part of the scheme, and the fire place is a piece of luck. Let this be the central feature of the room. Remove everything from the mantel and let the Christmas scheme culminate here. Outline your arched windows and doors with ropes of evergreen or laurel. If you live in a laurel country, use this beautiful green freely, for it is very effective. It will not dry so quickly as the evergreen, and makes a heavier rope. Carry this around the windows and doors, following their outlines and not adding festoons. Your arched doors will have an ecclesiastical effect quite in keeping with Christmas.

Against your warm neutral walls hang at mathematical intervals large wreaths of laurel—like small cart wheels. As these are seen on one side only they are simple to make. They should be broad and flat, but perfectly round. In your windows, instead of wreaths, hang great branches of holly. Let them spread out against the glass, confining them only in one place so they will be perfectly secure. Unless you have tried this plan of Christmas decorating you do not know its effectiveness. Use mistletoe on the chandelier—as much as your pocket-book will permit.

Back of the mantel and extending the width of the shelf, place a broad band of scarlet crépe paper. Outline this with a narrow band of evergreen—one band resting against the shelf, the other making a finish for the paper at the top. Above the paper, hang a large photograph or print of the Madonna and child. If you have a framed picture place it there, and let branches of holly connect it with the red below. A large half-tone cut from a magazine and mounted on gray charcoal paper will serve excellently. Old Christmas numbers will furnish you with a subject. The charcoal paper may be outlined with a narrow band of green. Place two large candlesticks on the mantel, and during the daytime keep fresh candles in them, the tall white candles coming against the red. A green fern or a small palm may be added to the mantel. A bas-relief in white of some fitting subject may be fastened against the red.

If you wish to carry out the Christmas idea more perfectly, all pictures except those of special significance should be excluded. Half-tones from the magazines will furnish endless subjects, fut few pictures should be used, or they will mar the wreath effect. When he room is arranged up to this point you may find that the interest is a little scattered. If so, connect doors, wreaths, and windows with a broad rope of green.

Use bright red and pure white about the room, and plenty of candles, for nothing suggests Christmas spirit as much as candlelight. The receiving of gifts and all Christmas festivities, except the dinner, should take place here. Keep the "Christmas room" intact until twelfth-night and then demolish it.

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
