The Mistletoe Heights Association recognizes Lorelei St. James of 1200 Buck St. as winner of October's Yard of the Month citation.

Lorelei's front and side yards on the southwest corner of Buck and Mistletoe Boulevard are full of color even after the relentless heat and drought that has lasted well into September.

Lorelei's
Gardening Tip:
When selecting

Notice, too, which
plants attract Texas

pollinators.

The front walk begins at the corner of the lot and gracefully curves across the front lawn to the porch. Two red knockout roses are the first plants to greet guests as they stroll along the walkway.

The roses are followed by an array of colorful and hardy blooming perennials and annuals. These tough-as-nails plants include salvias, such as the black and blue variety, autumn sage (Salvia greggii) in shades of red and purple, Mexican bush sage, rock rose mallow

(Pavonia lasiopetala) and lantana.

An annual purple sparkler cleome is tucked in near the porch. This dwarf variety, growing about a half to two-thirds the size of traditional garden cleome, serves as a focal point near the house. Clumps of Mexican feather grass add texture and subtle movement.

Along the street on the north and west sides of her home, Lorelei has replaced old and ailing mulberry trees with Dallas red crape



myrtles. As they grow, these multi-trunked trees will certainly become show-stoppers with their long-lasting blooms in summer followed by outstanding fall foliage.

As a bonus to the beautiful blooms, all of the plants in Lorelei's garden are attractive to butterflies, bees and hummingbirds. Pay particular attention as you walk past her house, especially in October, and you may catch a glimpse of monarch butterflies stopping by on their annual flight across Texas.



Fall garden chores

Take a soil sample and send in to see what if anything your property needs. You do not want to over fertilize your lawns or gardens. Use slow release fertilizers on your lawns now that the temps have dropped. Be sure to choose a day that is on your water schedule, as you need to water fertilizers in after application. Over fertilization is bad for our ground water. Try the organic option of top dressing your lawn with a ½ inch of finely screened compost and water in. This will add much needed organic matter to your lawn. You could also aerate your lawn and top dress with finely screened mulch to add even more organic matter and then water in. The heat decomposes organic matter fairly quickly. So be sure to replenish your lawn and garden.

Water deeply, on your water day. You can run shorter water times and then repeat to insure deep watering. 1 inch of water per week is all your lawn needs once well established and this includes rainfall. So you do not need additional water if we have received the inch.

Lawns stressed from the drought are more susceptible to disease and weeds. Hand pull weeds insuring that you remove the tap root and re-sod or overseed.

Trees this year will often have signs of heat related stress but it does not mean they are dead but using survival tactics to make it through by shutting down many of their processes to conserve energy. Do not drown your trees in water or over fertilize them. You do not want your trees to put on rapid growth just before their period of dormancy. Deeply water trees that show signs of

stress. Set slow soaker hoses along the drip line of your trees. A very slow running hose moved along the drip line will also work. The drip line is the edge of the tree's canopy that is where the tree takes up its water and nutrients.

Replace dead shrubs now while the plants have time to establish their root systems. Texas soils will remain warm enough to allow the roots to continue to grow during the winter providing water and nutrients to your newly planted shrubs. Don't wait until spring to plant.

Regularly pick up pecans, acorns and pods , to reduce unwanted volunteers.

Your garden beds would like to have at least an inch of compost worked in if they could talk. You can compost around your established plants and then cover with 3-4 inches of mulch. You can start to chill your bulbs for the spring or take a look at the bulbs offered by the Southern Bulb Company.

A little bit of information about Noise and not-so-good vibes

Noisy Trains, Tollways, Urban Development and Train Stations, let alone the coming impact of vibration

What is noise? It has a loudness, a pitch and a pattern. At 50 feet away, a city bus idling has about the same disturbing sound level as a lawnmower in use. A commuter bus traveling at

 The most common measure of noise "climate"

50 miles mph is somewhere between a jackhammer and a concrete mixer in use at 50 feet. Rail transit on steel tracks going 50 mph is significantly louder than a rock drill in use and a locomotive horn is audibly much louder than that. Light rail on new tracks is the equivalent of standing within 3 feet of a clothes washer running. Our new train system, from what I've been told, would be light rail on old tracks, which is

even louder, unless someone tells me differently and we're getting new train tracks.

Will the HUD threshold for Unacceptable Housing Environment

be quickly reached if we allow a train station with bus bays, next to our historic homes on the east side of the neighborhood?


A dBA is a weighted sound level. A ldn is a day/night sound level or the measure of a noise climate.

Ambient noise close to freeways - in our case, a tollway, *and* a freeway, *and* an urban transit system - have at least a dBA of 85, according to these charts provided by TRE. The HUD threshold for Unacceptable Housing Environment is 75. The EPA Ideal Residential Goal is below 55 dBA. Just do the math. I have not added in street traffic along Forest Park Blvd., leaf blowers, lawn mowers, air-conditioning units and not-to-mention a couple of bus bays.

It is my opinion that the development of a train station next to homes about 30 feet away is too damn much. Mistletoe Heights said no in 2007. According to the Mistletoe Heights Association, the train station was to be built on the northside of West Rosedale to keep our neighborhood from suffering too much impact, both from sound and traffic. Has something changed since 2007? Are we somehow more immune to sound and traffic?

It has been said to me that I do not have an open mind. That would be correct, I am proud of being a skeptic on all things. I, as of today, believe in the 2007 outcome of the neighborhood view that the train station and bus bays do not belong next to Mistletoe Blvd., Jerome Avenue, the 2100 residential blocks of our neighborhood. Rather, I believe the train station should be near the motels, hospitals and businesses of West Rosedale. Why are we revisiting this?

- Our allleys need to be beautified to the attractive grass paths and gardens they once were.
- Mistletoe Heights, by its name alone, should be the greatest Christmas neighborhood in the city, with a beautiful tree on all our porches, save those who don't observe the Christian holiday.
- All neighbors on the east side of our neighborhood should become informed about the impending traffic issues and possible rail station.






