Meeting with city officials concerning Forest Park Road Diet set for Sept. 10

Some Background about the Road Diet

At the MH neighborhood meeting on Feb. 21, our neighborhood voted in favor of supporting the Forest Park road diet proposal in an effort to make Forest Park a safer street. The proposal originated in Berkeley, but Berkeley felt our neighborhoods should work together since Forest Park affects us both. The proposal we presented to the city requests that the section of Forest Park that runs through Mistletoe Heights and Berkeley be re-striped, reducing the number of car lanes from four to three and adding bicycle lanes on both sides of the

street. It would reduce traffic to one lane in each direction and add a middle turn lane. So, how does that make Forest Park safer?

How the Road Diet Can Change Forest Park

The road diet will help enforce the speed limit. One of the best things about the proposed road diet is that it is self-policing. By having only one lane of traffic each direction, cars can only drive as fast as the slowest car on the road. That means if just one person is going the speed limit then every car behind them has to do the same.

The road diet will improve the flow of traffic. Adding a middle turn lane on Forest *Continued on Page 2*

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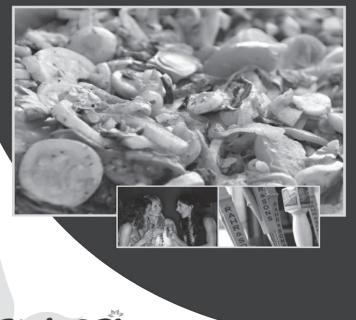
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Forest Park Road Diet (cont.)

Park will enable you to make a left turn onto your street without slowing or stopping the cars behind you. This decreases your risk of getting rear-ended. It also keeps traffic flowing.

The road diet will improve safety for pedestrians and bicyclists. The bike lanes don't just help bicyclists. They also serve as a buffer for pedestrians on the sidewalk. This is especially important for areas where the sidewalk is right next to Forest Park, such as the section between Mistletoe Dr. and Park Place. Many school children and exercise enthusiasts use this section to get to Lily B. or the Trinity Trails. The bike lane can provide a much-needed buffer from moving traffic if someone accidentally falls into Forest Park.

How the Road Diet Will Not Change Forest Park

The road diet will not make traffic backup at the W. Rosedale light any worse than it is right now. The road diet proposal we presented to the city suggested Forest Park open back up to four lanes in the area around W. Rosedale S., Irwin, and even Mistletoe Blvd. if needed.

The road diet will not make it more difficult to pull out onto Forest Park from your street or driveway. The stop lights that provide a break in traffic will still be there. The only difference is that you will have fewer lanes of traffic to contend with.

What's Next

The city is holding a public meeting about the Forest Park road diet on Monday, Sept. 10th. At this meeting they will unveil their progress on the road diet plan, but they are also using it to gauge public support for this project. Until now, every meeting we have held about the road diet has been a neighborhood meeting that was unattended by city leaders. This one is being held by the city and they are watching to see if we are united on this issue. It is extremely important for us to show up and support this project. It is time to start putting people's lives ahead of expediting traffic.

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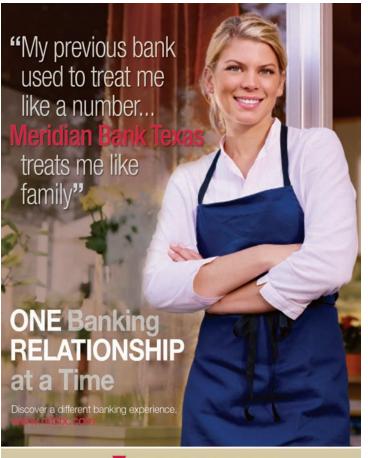
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Heed these back to school safety tips

The Safe Routes to School Program offers these tips:

For motorists

- · Slow down. Observe the speed limit in school zones at all times.
- Be especially careful when driving on neighborhood streets and around school zones. Always expect the unexpected.
- Be alert for youngsters walking to and from school as you back out of your driveway or leave your garage.
- Watch for children on bicycles, especially at intersections and driveways.
- Stop your car when you see lights flashing on a school bus. Red flashing lights indicate that the bus is stopped and students are getting on or off. Don't start driving until the red lights stop flashing. Be aware that a child may dash across the street.

For pedestrians

- Always walk on the sidewalk. If there is no sidewalk and you have to walk in the road, always walk facing traffic.
- · Wear bright clothing to increase visibility.
- · Cross only at corners or marked crosswalks.
- Stop at the curb or the edge of the road.
- Walk in groups; there is safety in numbers. Groups are more likely to be seen by drivers.
- Stop and look left, then right, then left again, before you step into the street.
- If you see a car, wait until it goes by. Then look left, right and left again until no cars are coming.

For bicyclists

- Wear a helmet.
- Be sure to have reflectors on your pedals, frame and wheels.
 Follow the rules of the road. Ride on the right, with the traffic, in single file.
 Obey stop signs and traffic lights. Never cross a street without looking for cars. Give the right of way to pedestrians in crosswalks. Walk your bicycle on sidewalks whenever pedestrians are around you.

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What was discussed last month

OLD BUSINESS

• The rezoning of all the properties on the north side of West Rosedale Street South has been completed and now are zoned Single Family/Duplex.

 Approximately 15 residents signed up for the City of Fort Worth's Tree Planting Program and about 20 trees were planted.

NEW BUSINESS

- Norm Stemple spoke on the shut-in royalty payments received by those who signed the XTO leases. The recent royalty payments will hold the leases until 2013. Following that one of two scenarios will occur. Either XTO will issue another shut-in payment to hold the leases until 2014 or XTO's plan to have transmission lines finished and will be producing gas. Otherwise, the leases will expire after 2014 and you will be free to renegotiate with new gas companies.
- Rosaline Eastepp spoke about the sound wall to be located on the berm on Vickery/Rosedale St. She along with Melissa Kohout are part of a committee working with NTTA and Joel Burns. NTTA has agreed to some landscaping measures to reduce sound, remove the dead shrubbery but also to eliminate the overgrowth that allowed the homeless to shelter unseen against the wall.
- Rosaline also spoke about the Streams and Valleys meeting regarding the Chisholm Trail Parkway and related projects, specifically The MH Bike Trail Access. The trailhead will be located at Mistletoe Drive and West Rosedale South and will have a pedestrian bridge crossing the Trinity (located near the current miniature train bridge), information kiosks, benches, bike racks and signage. There are also plans for a pedestrian and bike lane on the Vickery bridge. Everyone is invited to the FW Trinity Trails/Friends of the River/ Streams & Valleys ribbon cutting for the new bicycle path on August 25th @ 10
- Also, Streams and Valleys is recruiting more volunteers, canoes and small boats to clean up the Trinity River Oxbow located near the zoo between the Trinity River and Mistletoe Heights.
- Susan Pressley spoke about the Forest Park Blvd. Road Diet and how Mistletoe Heights and Berkeley have been working for over a year to get some measure of traffic relief on Forest Park Blvd. Joel Burns was instrumental in getting the speed radar sign on the curve prior to any other measures being planned and residents are already noticing a significant impact on speeding.
- TPW & other city departments will hold a meeting to reveal plans for a road diet but more significantly to gauge the public's interest and feelings about the traffic issues. Susan encouraged everyone to attend the meeting on

September 10, 2010 at 6 p.m. at the Hilton Midtown. She suggested everyone walk, ride bikes, bring your children. Just please make it to the meeting.

- Mike Danella spoke on the landscaping and maintenance of Jerome and Forest Park Blvd. He proposed hiring a company to perform these services. Discussion commenced and resulted in a notice going out to accept bids for a yearly contract to maintain Forest Park Blvd and Jerome.
- Mike Brennan spoke on the TexRail Project, Passenger Rail Working Group formed with the city, the T and other entities to push forward the TexRail Project. The PRWG is tasked with trying to streamline the project and to try and cut through bureaucratic red tape. He explained the Medical Center Station's Next Step from 3rd quarter 2012 through 4th quarter of 2016.
- Final Environmental Assessment and completion of initial engineering is slated for next spring.
- Final Design, which gets into the details like the sound wall, lighting, etc., will kickoff late next year.
- He anticipates the FTA will award funding and construction will begin in the 4th quarter of 2014.
- TexRail will begin operations in the 4th quarter of 2016. However, the working group's goal is to try to speed up the project.
- Another goal is to try to "reach" a new type of vehicle, a universal vehicle such as the Sadler trains.
- Mike Brennan also kindly fielded questions and offered guidance with whom to speak with regarding our questions about design issues, wall/ sound, etc.

Claudia Camp raised the issue of the neighborhood wanting a longer sound wall and asked which part of the Next Step process would negotiating that issue take place.

- Cynthia Wahl spoke about the newsletter. Proposed increasing advertising rates to align with other neighborhoods and to help generate income. She gave the advertising rates for Fairmount, Berkeley and Arlington Heights. She proposed raising rates as follows: business card \$25, 1/4 page
- \$50, ½ page \$100 and full page \$200. Rosaline Eastepp made a motion to accept and Claudia Camp seconded the motion. Would begin in Feb. 2013.

Levels of giving for this year are:

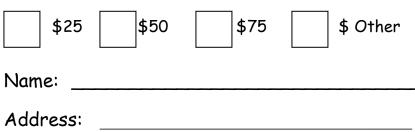
