When was the last time you were lost in a moment?

It is often difficult to recognize that moment until you've had some time to look back and appreciate it. When you do have the chance to recall that moment, it's important to remember what exactly made you feel that way. My moments are often found when I'm out in nature or having a unique experience with someone. Everything else disappears and there is a moment of clarity when you realize that nothing else matters. The fears and uncertainty of life dissolve. Some of my moments include saying, "I do" to my wife; the first time I held my son; when I lie in the park staring at the sky. In every one of these instances, I remember thinking to myself, how can life be so good?

Last week when I pulled up to a drive-thru window and was

waiting for the nice cashier to take my money, I had one of these great experiences. The cashier chirped, "The people ahead of you paid it forward," as she passed my food through the window.

Confused, I looked ahead for the car—it could have been the mudsplashed truck, the Mercedes, or the minivan—which at this point was headed toward the highway. This happened to me at a time when I was very stressed with



what was going on in my life. The cashier giggled, "Sir, you can take your food." I was disoriented. I felt touched. I was lost in a moment. It was in that moment that made me think about how I live my life. Am I a giver? Do I receive often? Am I the example that I want my son to follow? Am I the guy that puts a tear in my wife's eye because of who I aspire to be?

Pay it forward is a trend that is happening everywhere. It's just as likely that the preceding car will pick up your tab at a Dunkin' Donuts drive-through in Detroit or a McDonald's drive-through in Fargo. These acts of generosity are taking place at a time when the nation's legislators can't seem to speak a civil word unless reading from Dr. Seuss. The director of hospitality at Chick-fil-A, Mark Moraitakis, said, "We really don't know why it's happening but if I had to guess, I'd say there is just a lot of stuff going on in the country that people find discouraging, paying it forward is a way to counteract that." I agree with him.

The anonymity of the drive-through is what makes it especially easy to pay it forward because it dispenses with any awkwardness and suspicion about motives. You can pull away before the next car pulls up and discovers the gift that is impossible to refuse. Kindness stems from feeling blessed and wanting to share good fortune. I was told by

the cashier that most want to pay it forward in gratitude to drivers who waved their car ahead of them in line or after noticing in their rearview mirror someone who was visibly upset, and they wanted to offer them a reason to smile.



Water Restrictions Movie Night

Stage 1 limits outdoor watering with an irrigation system or hose-end sprinkler to a maximum of two assigned days per week for all customers. Residential customers whose addresses end in odd numbers (1, 3, 5, 7 or 9) are permitted to water lawn and landscapes only on Sundays and Thursdays. Addresses ending in even numbers (2, 4, 6, 8 or 0) may water on Saturdays and Wednesdays only. Nonresidential customers, including apartments, businesses, parks and common areas, can water only on Tuesday and Fridays. No watering is allowed on Mondays.

The time of day restriction, which prohibits outdoor watering with sprinklers between the hours of 10 a.m. and 6 p.m., continues to be in effect. Movie Night: If you have been talking with your neighbor's, you heard about movie night. We do this twice a year. The spring movie night is at 8:30 pm and earlier in the fall due to the time the sun sets. The movie will be decided in the Chat Room www. facebook.com/groups/mhneighbors. Join the discussion!

Email Guidelines

A friendly reminder of the guidelines for the neighborhood email list serve:

What:

MH Email Distribution List guidelines for the email address: residents@mistletoeheights.org **Purpose:**

The email distribution list is used for announcements, emergencies, lost pets, threats to life and limb, criminal activity, etc. It may also be used for thoughtful, civil and respectful discussion of issues vital to the neighborhood.

Moderator:

The email list is not direct delivery, but rather has one or more moderators. The moderators review each incoming e-mail and release the e-mail to the list according to the below set of guidelines.

Replies:

When reply-all is used, the reply will be sent to the whole list (through a moderator). When an individual reply to the sender is used (not a reply-all), the reply is sent to the individual sender only and is not sent to the whole list, and is not seen by the moderators. (Note that this is different from the way the previous info@mistletoeheights.org e-mail system worked.)

Email Guidelines:

- No political messages
- No religious messages
- No commercial messages (and that includes stuff for sale, houses, etc). The only thing allowed is sales hosted by charitable organizations, schools, garage sales and the occasional "I'm moving out of MH & I need to sell my stuff so I'm selling it cheap".
- No negative messages about neighbors, no attacks on neighbors
- Discussion on neighborhood issues should be thoughtful, civil, and respectful. Each email should have a purpose in improving our neighborhood and moving a discussion forward, not in just "piling on" to a point that has already been made. It should not be used for "venting" frustration in the absence of a positive contribution to an issue.
- The moderator can ask a submitter to reword a message to make it acceptable
- When responding to an individual's request (such as a recommendation for a painter, plumber, etc), respond directly to the requestor. After the requestor has received the responses, they may then send a note back to the list summarizing the responses in a single e-mail, so all may benefit.
- Members may be removed for consistent violation of the above guidelines
- The moderator has the final say on what is sent out. These are only guidelines. The moderators may use their own judgment in occasionally stepping outside the guidelines should they consider it in the best interest of the neighborhood.
- The moderators may adjust these guidelines over time to improve the list's benefit to the neighborhood and we ask for our neighbor's patience as we do so. Comments may be sent to moderator@mistletoeheights.org.





There were big group activities to show them around town, and simple family dinners at our kitchen table. As a young kid who's an only child, I just felt incredibly cool having these teenage siblings to hang around with! I learned so much about life in other countries and enjoyed being able to teach them about my own. As I grew to be the same age as the kids who came, they became permanent good friends who still enrich my life. My parents grew close to them as well, and last year when a girl who stayed with us 15 years ago came back as a chaperone, they were thrilled to have her stay at their house again.

The scene at the airport as the kids return home is always a mess of hugs and tears and contact information exchange. There are endless words of thanks from kids who have been forever changed by the kindness we've shown them. But receiving this gratitude feels completely unnecessary. We gave them a place to call home here in Texas, but they gave us the far greater gift of making the world feel like a smaller and sweeter place. 

Join Botanical Research Institute of Texas (BRIT) scientists and botanists at the BRIT campus, 1700 University Drive in the heart of the Fort Worth Cultural District, for Prairie Day on Saturday, May 3, from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. This is BRIT's free, annual, outdoor celebration highlighting the beauty and vibrancy of the North Texas native landscape with familyoriented, hands-on activities, events, demonstrations, and entertainment that showcase the native grasses, wildflowers, and vegetation that blankets the BRIT campus.

A tradition begun in its first year during Prairie Day is the making of seedballs to help populate the BRIT campus's side meadow with a variety of native plants. A Native American tradition, seed balls are tiny modules containing all the ingredients to give seeds an extra hand up in getting started – seeds, humus, dried powdered red clay, and sand. When mixed with water and rolled into balls, they become little gardens that are tossed into areas that need vegetation. They will lay dormant until the right amount of rain falls. Exhibits, demonstrations, and live entertainment will be provided.

Call for Entries

The 2014 EcoScape Contest is open to residential landscapes within Fort Worth city limits and Fort Worth's wholesale customer cities, which include Aledo, Bethesda Water Supply Corp., Burleson, Crowley, Dallas/Fort Worth International Airport, Dalworthington Gardens, Edgecliff Village, Everman, Forest Hill, Grand Prairie, Haltom City, Haslet, Hurst, Keller, Kennedale, Lake Worth, Northlake, North Richland Hills, Richland Hills, Roanoke, Saginaw, Southlake, Trophy Club Municipal Utility District, Westlake, Westover Hills, Westworth Village and White Settlement.

(Contest judges, sponsors, City of Fort Worth employees or their families are not eligible for prizes. The EcoScape Contest is co-sponsored by the Fort Worth Water Department and BRIT.)

- The contest features front yard landscapes (1,000 ft. minimum)
- Up to three residential award winners (1st, 2nd and 3rd place) will receive prizes. Community gardens, demonstration gardens and commercial landscapes are not eligible to participate.
- All participants must agree to have their landscapes photographed and consent to allow such photographs to be used by the city.
- All winners must agree to be present to answer visitor questions from 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. on tour day.

Judging Criteria

- **Design** Aesthetic appeal; composition; use of color and plant variety
- Water Conservation Efficient irrigation/water use; use of non-vegetative materials such as fences, walls, walks, etc.; use of native or adapted plants; reduced turf area; and use of mulches
- Appropriate Maintenance Landscape tidy healthy, disease and pest free plants; no weeds; plants pruned as appropriate
