The streets were interconnected with sidewalks to encourage walking and biking, lined with trees, and buildings were placed a uniform distance from the curb. Intentionally designed to be densely populated, Seaside encouraged residents to build up three-story homes on small lots no more than a five-minute walk to the shops and restaurants of the town center. Mandatory porches are set close enough to the street for easy conversations between walkers and porch-sitters. All these features demonstrate an architecture that helps create and maintain friendships.

I left Seaside with t-shirt that read "New Town...Old Ways"

and a greater appreciation for my neighborhood. While I don't think the Trinity River compares to white sand or clear ocean water, our front porch community of Mistletoe Heights certainly affords us many of the benefits of this quaint, ocean community of Seaside.

Spring is around the corner and summer will be close behind. Over the next few months our Mistletoe Heights Association will be hosting several events. Marshall Meyer has been the Mistletoe Heights Neighborhood Police Officer ("NPO") since August 19, 2017. Most residents only know Officer Meyer for his e-mails reporting the latest victim of a car break-in, but not everyone has had a chance to get to know the man behind the badge.

What most Mistletoe residents don't know about Marshall is that he has a dark past — he's from Dallas. (However, being a former

Dallasite myself, I vote that we all forgive his origins.) After graduating from Lake Highlands High School, Marshall attended Sam Houston State University where he was a member of the golf team. Marshall finished his undergraduate degree at Tarleton State University. While in school at Tarleton, he was recruited by the Fort Worth Police Department.

However, he still isn't quite done with school yet - he is currently working on getting his master's degree in criminal justice from Tarleton.

Although this is not his first NPO assignment (he was previously assigned to the Tanglewood/Overton Park area), Marshall says that it's his favorite because of Mistletoe's close-knit community. Mistletoe's collaboration with Marshall has already made our neighborhood a safer place. In October of last year, based on tips he received from our neighborhood email chain, Marshall was able to apprehend the perpetrator behind a rash of car break-ins. The best thing we can do to continue assisting Marshall in keeping Mistletoe crime-free, is to keep communicating concerns on the neighborhood email chain.

Marshall now lives here in Fort Worth with his German Shepherd, Jax. When he isn't working, he enjoys keeping up with his golf game and watching is favorite TV show, The Big Bang Theory. A major part of his job is building relationships with people in our community, so he is always happy to meet with residents in person over a cup of coffee, or maybe even some oatmeal raisin cookies (his favorite kind). I hope everyone will join me in welcoming Marshall to the Mistletoe community!


The Mistletoe Heights Easter Egg Hunt Is Just Around the Corner

Charlie's Field

Dozens of Mistletoe Heights residents gathered in Newby Park on January 7, a bleak Sunday with a threat of rain, to dedicate Charlie's Field in memory of Drew Medford.

Charlie Bourland, severely disabled, died January 18, 2015. Drew Medford, a promising athlete and 2016 graduate of Paschal High School, died August 18, 2016, in an auto accident on the Chisholm Trail Parkway. The young men grew up on the same street and became fast friends.

"Two young neighbor boys, born and raised on Mistletoe Drive, left this world at young ages. Their lives impacted many," says a metal plaque affixed to a stone base behind the baseball field's backstop.


"Drew, a pitcher and catcher for Paschal, was headed to play baseball at TCU. Charlie, a student at McLean, was Drew's lifetime friend, whom he loved with a sweet and tender kindness.

"Given to honor their precious lives, by their friends and neighbors in Mistletoe Heights," the plaque says.

The dedication ceremony was planned and organized by Kathy Jo and Marc Rogers, Deborah Jung, Josh Lindsay and Denise Semple.

Among those who spoke were Henry Bourland, Charlie's older brother; Sergio Conchas, a friend of Drew Medford; Josh Lindsay, former Mistletoe Heights Association president; Corey Bearden, current MHA president; and Coach Lee, whose Little League players often use Charlie's Field at Newby Park. Cal Rustad provided and set up the sound system, and Austin's Underdawgs food truck was available for the purchase of hot dogs and drinks.

The Mistletoe Express, your neighborhood newsletter, has been named one of the 10 best in Fort Worth at a citywide awards luncheon hosted by Mayor Betsy Price.

Outgoing newsletter editor Mary Ellen Peipert was on hand to accept a certificate of the award from Mayor Price at the luncheon, held at Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary on January 20.

The other nine newsletters honored for their work during 2017 were from the neighborhoods Crawford Farms, Heritage, Marine Creek, Tehama Ridge, Berkeley Place, Eastern Hills, Fairmount, Ridglea North and West Meadowbrook.

Fort Worth has 295 neighborhoods registered with the city,

according to Tabitha Butler, community engagement liaison for Mistletoe Heights and about 50 other neighborhoods.

The awards luncheon recognized a variety of organizations and people who, according to the city website, "engage residents and build stronger communities."

The 2017 award, for example, for the best neighborhood association went to Sunset Hills. The best neighborhood police officer during the past year was Donald Shipp.

Mary Ellen stressed that the Mistletoe Express is a team effort. Besides neighbors who contribute articles to the newsletter, she cited the design team of neighbor Elisa Rode, whose advertising agency Kearley & Company, on South Main

Street, does the newsletter layout.

The new newsletter editors, Hannah and Jeff Parks, assumed their duties at the November 21 meeting of members of the Mistletoe Heights Association.




