Call to order: meeting was called to order at 6:38 PM Approval of Minutes: minutes from MHA Neighborhood Meeting held on May 16, 2023 were approved.

OFFICERS REPORTS:

President: Mark Philpot

- Stepping down after November Elections
- Transitioning well: anticipate a smooth transition to the new leadership.
- Neighborhood involvement: Goal of Graham Brizendine and Mark Philpot is be more proactive, mobilizing neighbors to help with projects. Our neighborhood has longstanding traditions, including several events, (see schedule below), and it takes involvement of many residents to keep these activities going.
- Historic Book spearheaded by Melanie Smith is progressing forward. A private entity has offered to publish. Amazon publishing is another option. Hope to an have update by end of the year.

Vice President: Graham Brizendine

• Was asked to chair the meeting. He began by introducing himself and spoke briefly about his connection to the neighborhood.

Treasurer: Jeri Jo Blackmon

- Distributed income expense sheet, donation sheet so far, \$4,060 has been donated to the association this year.
- Going forward, the MH Newsletter will be electronic. If you want a copy, be sure to add yourself to the email list.
- How to join the email list: www.mistletoeheights.org > left side select email list > complete the form and submit.

NEW BUSINESS:

• Text Update System: an email was sent describing this concept. Purpose: a text system for alerts, safety related incidences, etc.

Examples: missing children, meeting announcements, and when NPO needs information sent to the residents. This does not include weather-related alerts provided by the City. It will be strictly voluntary, and anyone can opt in. The plan is to avoid overuse or text fatigue by limiting the content to urgent or necessary info. When someone moves out of the neighborhood, they are opted out of the text alert system. It can be customized to personal preferences. Texts will be notification only, not a reply system. Cost: 5 cents per text message per recipient. Example: if 300 people sign up, it would cost about \$15.00 for one text. Open to discussion, Q&A among attendees.

• Motion to approve, seconded and approved. All in favor.

• TexRail Update: Trinity Metro hired a firm to oversee construction. Construction will start next year. The other aspect of the TexRail concept is the Baylor Transit — oriented development. Mike Brennan, of Near Southside, spoke on the proposed design in detail at our neighborhood meeting in May.

OPEN DISCUSSION:

- Fall Cleanup Day (alleys, West Berm, East Berm, Newby)
- Social Hour for adults was suggested a great idea but it will require people to make this happen.
- Block Party again, this will require people to help organize.
- MH Directory a form will be coming out for purposes of updating the directory. Look for the link to access the directory in the newsletter.

UPCOMING EVENTS:

- Movie Night October (TBD): need volunteers! Mark Philpot has the screen. Still to do: decide the date, get projector, pick movie. This year it will be hosted at the Triangle.
- National Night Out October 3, 2023: The Fort Worth Police Department invites all residents to participate in the 40th Annual "National Night Out" Celebration. Residents are asked to turn on their outside lights and spend the evening outdoors with their neighbors, police officers, and other City personnel.
- Pumpkin Judging October 30: Angie Arlington
- MH Neighborhood Meeting November 14, 2023 6:30 PM, venue TBD: annual Officer elections.
- Bow Tying Party November 19, 2023: Gary Willis' house on Irwin. Need people to help!
- Christmas Party December 2, 2023, 6:30-8:30 PM: Jeri Jo Blackmon's home, 1408 Mistletoe Drive. It will be a potluck; everyone attending can bring a dish/dessert/drinks. There may be an appearance by Santa and Mrs. Clause.

Tom Richey shares tips and information about restaurants in and around our neighborhood.


A good many years ago, as a college student in the Bronx, I was close to a Little Italy neighborhood with many restaurants. There were two types of restaurants — the little neighborhood, checkered tablecloth-type place, similar to where Michael Corleone had dinner with Sollozo and McCluskey in "The Godfather", and the other was a more cosmopolitan-type place with black booths and white tablecloths. Either type place of course could have guys sitting in the corner, the type with black shirts and white ties, always facing the door.

That said, the first time I walked into Tre Mogli, it was like being transported to the more urbane of the two as described. I liked it immediately and had hopes that the entire experience would be good. I was there with one of my sons and my daughter as we have a custom that when my wife, Eileen, is out of town, they take me to dinner. In other words, they choose the place, I get to pay — it seemingly has worked well for a good many years now.

Tre Mogli is owned by the Trident Group, a three-person

group with Stefon Rishel as Executive Chef (Tre Mogli means three wives in Italian, a nod to the Trident wives). The group also owns and operates Wishbone & Flynt which

"To meander a bit, I have to say that Wishbone & Flynt is very good. They do one of the best burgers I have ever had, half bison, half beef, prepared in duck fat (as are the fries). The Old Fashioned they serve is where I learned that chocolate bitters is what makes an Old Fashioned superb! It is quite casual inside and also has some seating outside, although as far as this summer goes, that is a non-starter, at least for me. They also have a "speakeasy" type room (the Amber Room) just past the bar that serves excellent craft cocktails. Needless to say, I like it."



Back to Tre Mogli, the menu is quite good and offers both individual dishes as well as family-style. Last time there, we started with calamari, meatballs, and cocktails followed by family-style Chicken Parmesan and family-style Bolognese, along with a bottle of Barbera. It was all excellent. The service was impeccable. The dining area itself is good sized, there is also an upstairs area for private parties so the noise level was minimal. We were very happy with everything. They offer valet parking as street parking on South Main is hit or miss, although there is a small lot around the corner in front of Wishbone & Flynt.

Give both places a try. Note that Tre Mogli is a little more upscale and maybe more of an adult venue. If you happen to see Stefon, say hello from us, he is recognizable...

Update on the book of Mistletoe Heights History

Through extensive research, the book has evolved to be an in-depth history detailing the development of one of the earliest suburbs in Fort Worth. The book begins with the origin story — a fascinating and convoluted history involving land grants by the Republic of Texas followed with land ownership by a pioneer Texas rancher named Lemuel Edwards whose descendants continue to impact the city today. The book details the varied architecture in the neighborhood — most of which is a historic district thought to be eligible for the National Register. Houses in the neighborhood are generally 100 years old and range from bluff-top mansions to cozy bungalows — most with front porches. The entire book is filled with vintage photographs. After the general background, the book becomes a collection of narratives which provide an informative and entertaining history of the colorful residents of Mistletoe Heights in the first half of the 20th century. (A few of the documentaries extend into later years.)

This book is a fascinating view into an early 20th century "suburb" in Fort Worth — a time period and location not chronicled to date. It provides a long gaze into the past within the context of the city, the North Texas region, the greater state of Texas, and the United States as a whole. This book is believed to be the first to include documentary information on the surrounding African American Southside community and the first to document women in the Southside community by their full given names and their accomplishments. This book highlights the stories of a wide group of people — the privileged and the hard working, the rich and the poor, and the differences in opportunities for Whites as compared to Blacks and their contrasting class conditions. All the articles illustrate the ups and downs of life which invariably are a reality for all.

The book highlights many dynamic and/or interesting people of the early 20th century who made their homes in this Southside community beginning about the time of World War I. Through the many articles, the reader can gaze into a time long ago and understand the differences and similarities to life today. Many of the citizens documented in the book contributed greatly to a young and growing Fort Worth, the growing state of Texas, and the developing United States. Interested readers will find well-documented articles full of information on the 100-year-old houses and their early residents. The book highlights homes crafted with materials and artisanship rarely seen in construction today. As each article unfolds, the visual impact of the historical photos of the houses and people connects the reader to the first half of the 20th century. This history is a useful resource to researchers striving to put together the pieces of the history of Fort Worth.

Notable articles likely to draw particular interest include:

- An article about a home on Irwin Avenue highlights the Comanche capture of family members who lived in the home in the early 20th century.
- An article about a home on Clara Street highlights a young girl who survived the Holocaust internment camps.
- An article about a home on Mistletoe Drive highlights an early British female ventriloquist and clown.

- Seven articles about the 2100 block of Harrison Avenue highlight early Black residents who were able to become homeowners in the Jim Crow era.
- An article about a home on West Rosedale Street South highlights the development of the Fort Worth Boat Club.
- An article about a home on Harrison Avenue highlights Lena Pope who established the well-known institution by that name which continues to serve the needs of children today.
- Another article about a home on Harrison Avenue highlights one of Teddy Roosevelt's Rough Riders and also Fort Worth's first park superintendent.
- The article about a home on Mistletoe Boulevard highlights the local gun dealer whose clients included famous early 20th century gangsters and lawmen.
- An article about another home on Mistletoe Boulevard highlights Gladys Wright, who partnered to write "Texas, our Texas" with TCU music professor William J. Marsh.
- An article about another home on Mistletoe Drive highlights an early felon who spent time in Leavenworth Prison and later the Davey O'Brien family.
- An article about another home on Harrison Avenue highlights an early baseball player who was also a bootlegger.

Negotiations are now underway for printing the manuscript. As the process is complicated and tedious, there is not yet a definitive date when the book will be published. Presales are now closed, but those who have not yet purchases a copy will have the opportunity to do so once the book has been printed. We of Mistletoe Heights owe a debt of gratitude to neighbor Liz Manion for her work in formatting and layout and to neighbor Annette Gunter for proofing the manuscript. My heartfelt thanks also goes to all neighbors who have been so supportive of this project for the past few years.
